Did You Know...?



Shullsburg has been the home of some interesting people at times. One of them was William Law. He was born in County Tyrone, Ireland in 1809. His family immigrated first to Pennsylvania then to Canada. He grew up in the Toronto area, marrying 19-year-old Jane Silverthorn in 1833. In 1839 missionaries visited the area. William and his wife were baptized and then traveled by

wagon to nearby Kirtland with a group of converts. There the Laws met Prophet Joseph Smith, the founder of a still fairly new sect that called themselves "The Church of the Latter Day Saints", more commonly known today as Mormons.

William Law became known for his education, writing ability and great energy. Law and his wife traveled to Nauvoo, Illinois along with other members of the Church. There Law became a wealthy mill and storeowner. He must have made quite an impression on Joseph Smith. On January 19, 1841 Joseph Smith "received a revelation in which the Lord named William Law to become a Counselor in the First Presidency." Law began moving within the inner circles of the Church hierarchy, working closely with Smith. He also served on the City Council of Nauvoo and as a registrar of the City's University.

However, it wasn't long before Law was at odds with the teachings of the Prophet, questioning the validity of "continuing revelation" and refusing to accept Plural Marriage (polygamy). It has been rumored that Joseph Smith invited Jane Law to leave William and become one of his (Smith's) wives, which may have been the final straw for William.

Law set up a newspaper called the *Nauvoo Expositor*, printing information to expose Joseph Smith's lesser-known teachings such as plural marriage and control of local politics by the Church, which caused great dissention among the church membership. Smith (who was the elected Mayor of Nauvoo) retaliated by inciting a mob of church members to destroy Law's printing office and press shortly after the first edition was printed.

Through various mechanisms of the Church, Smith pressed to remove Law from the Church membership, considering him "a Judas in our midst". He accused Law of scheming to plan his murder. His efforts found success in April 1844 when William Law was officially excommunicated from the Church on the charge of "apostasy" or defection from the faith.

Law attempted to form his own church calling it "the True Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints", but was unsuccessful. However, as a result of articles printed in Law's newspaper and public unrest incited by the Prophet's teachings, the Governor of Illinois declared Joseph Smith and his brother, Hyrum "dangerous men, guilty of treason" and ordered the Illinois Militia to arrest them. The Smith brothers and two other elders of the Church surrendered themselves to authorities in Carthage, IL and were jailed on June 24, 1844. Three days later an angry mob of armed town militiamen attacked the jail. Both Joseph Smith and his brother, Hyrum, died of multiple gun shot wounds. The other two elders lived to pronounce Joseph Smith a martyr of the Church.

William Law and his family left the area after some accused him of being present in the mob at the time of Smith's murder. He eventually settled in, you guessed it, Shullsburg, Wisconsin. Where, according to a Mormon historian, "he lived a long life and died in well-deserved obscurity still filled with hatred and bitterness on January 19, 1892." According to local information, Law practiced as a medical doctor in Shullsburg and was well liked and respected. William and Jane Law are buried in Evergreen Cemetery, Shullsburg.

Obituaries



Bergen (**Tink**) **Townsend** (**30**), Shullsburg, died May 15, 2009 at the age of 95.

Bergen lived in Shullsburg all of his life. He married Gertrude Gile in 1935. He worked for the Pet Milk Co. & AMPI Receiving and Testing Station in Shullsburg for 40 years, 34 of which he was a station manager, retiring in 1975.

Bergen was an avid sports fan and will be especially remembered for his baseball abilities. He was a catcher for Shullsburg, Galena and Apple River city teams until he was 37 years old, and a faithful fan of the Chicago Cubs for many years. He also has been mentioned in a recently released book titled, "Galena's Baseball Legacy," written by Don Korte. Bergen had served as a regional commissioner for Southwest Wisconsin District Semi-Pro Baseball for several years. He was also an "unofficial" local historian.

Surviving are his wife of 72 years, Gert, at home; their children, Ken (Bernadine) Townsend (54), of rural East Dubuque, IL, Jim (Carol) Townsend (56), of Bellevue, IA,


